3		APPENDIX A-DEFINITIONS
4		
5	1.	Boot stage. Part of the flowering phase of plant growth, defined as the time when
6		the seedhead emerges from the sheath of the flag leaf.
7	2.	Brassicas. A genus of plants in the mustard family (Brassicaceae). The members
8		of the genus are informally known as cruciferous vegetables, cabbages,
9	_	or mustard plants.
10	3.	Browse. Leaf and twig growth of shrubs, woody vines, trees, cacti, and other
11		non-herbaceous vegetation available for animal consumption.
12	4.	Commercially unavailable. A grass-fed organic dairy animal is commercially
13		unavailable for purchase whenever an operation certified to this Standard
14		demonstrates to the certifying agent that it cannot timely obtain an animal with
15		the operation's animal attributes.
16	5.	Dairy livestock production operation. A certified grass-fed organic operation
17		with a milking parlor where a least one lactating animal is milked.
18	6.	De Minimis. An amount or action that is below the threshold of programmatic
19		concern.
20	7.	Farm Herd List. A list of all ruminant animals at the certified operation that is
21		routinely updated by the certified operation.
22	8.	Forage cubes or pellets. Dessicated and compressed forages Forbs. Flowering
23		plants that are not grasses or sedges. Some examples include clovers, alfalfa, and
24		milkweed.
25	9.	Grass(es). Graminoids, monocotyledonous plants with narrow leaves growing
26		from the base Legumes. Plants of the pea or pulse family, many of which are
27		recognized for their ability to fix atmospheric nitrogen in the soil.
28	10.	Operation's animal attributes. A list of attributes of the animals at the operation
29		that are set forth in the Application and may include but is not limited to, breed,
30		age, health, replacement transport time, body score, disease/illness profile, source
31		location, performance history, etc.
32	11.	Small grains/cereal. A cultivated plant that produces seeds that come from
33		grasses such as wheat, millet, rice, barley, oats, rye, triticale, flax and sorghum.
